# Avoiding Election Infection

Here we are again in the midst of another election season. The yard signs are popping up, the mailers are filling our recycle bins, and the airwaves are overflowing with ads telling us how bad the other guy or gal is. As followers of Jesus there is an understanding—as members of both the Kingdom of God and the kingdom of the world—that we are called to engage in the political process. But how do we best do it?

I will never forget being a brand new pastor and sitting in on a Bible study when a lady stood up and very sincerely asked, "Is it even possible to be a Christian and be a Democrat?" Over the last four years we have heard the cry, "How could any Christian vote for Donald Trump?" So who is right? Where do Christians fit in our two-party system?

In 2018 Pastor Tim Keller, a well-known theologically conservative pastor in New York City, wrote an op-ed article in the New York Times titled, <u>How Do Christians Fit Into the Two-Party System? They Don't.</u> Throughout the article he dives into the tension that so many Jesus followers feel around where we fit. Here is an excerpt...

This emphasis on package deals puts pressure on Christians in politics. For example, following both the Bible and the early church, Christians should be committed to racial justice and the poor, but also to the understanding that sex is only for marriage and for nurturing family (being pro-life). One of those views seems liberal and the other looks oppressively conservative (emphasis mine). The historical Christian positions on social issues do not fit political into contemporary alignments.

So Christians are pushed toward two main options: One is to



withdraw and try to be apolitical. The second is to assimilate and fully adopt one party's whole package in order to have your place at the table. Neither of these options is valid.

Where does that leave us? Obviously there is no perfect answer, but let me offer a few ways to be engaged in the process and to remain faithful to Jesus. (Please offer me grace as you read).

- 1. Vote your conscience And go make a difference: The complexity of theissues before us is overwhelming. For one Christian the most important issue is racial equality, for another it is biblical marriage and so forth. The thing is there is not ONE single solution for any issue, so vote your conscience and then get out there and make a difference! For example, for many Christians, their number one issue when it comes to voting is life-and for good reason. If that is the case, then vote that way AND find a way to better live out that value out by volunteering at a pregnancy center, becoming a foster parent or helping a single mother go back to school, etc.
- 2. Don't buy into all the negativity: Part of being Salt and Light is not joining in all the mudslinging and gossiping. Take a deep breath

and pray before writing your next post on Facebook or having that challenging conversation with a friend or family member who has a different viewpoint.

- 3. Talk to someone on the other side of the aisle: I just had a great conversation with someone who has very different political leanings than I do. I came away having learned something about that person and why they believe what they believe, and amazingly we are still friends.
- 4. Through it all remember that Jesus is King: On the two weekends leading up to the election we are going to look at what Jesus has to say about People and Truth and then, the week after the election, we will gather around the truth that Jesus is King. With all the uncertainty surrounding the election, the Supreme Court, etc. the one thing that is certain is that Jesus is still King.

I do not pretend to have all the answers, and I have offered these words in humility as I seek to be a good citizen and a faithful follower of Jesus. Join me in praying for our nation, and may each of us be a part of the solution.



## **Re-Focusing Our Worship**

In the song "A Little Longer" by Jenn Johnson, she writes about a conversation with Jesus in which she asks him:

"What can I do for You, What can I bring to You, What kind of song would You like me to sing? I'll dance a dance for You, Pour out my love for You, What can I do for You Beautiful King?"

So often the "busyness" of life lures us away from just being with Jesus. I'm guilty of letting noise, distractions, work and activities keep me so preoccupied that spending time with my King is placed on the back-burner.

Taking a cue from the song lyrics above, one way to re-focus on Jesus is through music and **the act of purposeful worship**. Every element of our weekend worship services is important, and I find the times we share in music connects us, unites us, and allows us to tell Jesus we are thankful for all he has done. When we come together, whether in-person or online, in lifting our voices, hearts, and hands to the Savior, something beautiful happens on the inside, and it doesn't have to stop on Sunday morning!

Outside of our worship services there are times when I will sit on my living room floor in the dark and just "be" with Jesus. I will often start by singing or listening to a favorite worship song to thank him and bless him. Sometimes I pour out my heart to him; other times I simply sit in the dark and let him take the lead. It is always a time of refreshment and connection.



At the end of the song "A Little Longer," Jenn writes:

Then I hear You say:

"You don't have to do a thing.

Simply be with me and let those things go,

They can wait another minute..."

This response blesses my heart every time I hear it. When life feels too busy, too overwhelming, or too stressful, we can stop and remember that the King who came to Earth in human form to live and die for us, to set us free and to give us every good thing...our wonderful King Jesus, wants to spend time with us. The beauty is that whether we worship corporately or one-on-one with him, we are blessed when we bless him.

## **Kids and the Presence of God**

Teaching your kids to live in the Presence of God is a wonderful gift to them and to your family! So how do we teach our kids to recognize God?

Read the Word of God to them. (Use a kids Bible) It doesn't have to be every morning, or bedtime. If you miss a day, a week, a month, give yourself grace, and begin again.

The Bible is full of true stories that show God talking to people. God spoke to Abraham, Rebecca, Jacob, and many others. He spoke through the prophets in the Old Testament, and he spoke to his church through the apostles. The more your children know of how God spoke to and through people in the Bible, the more they will understand his ways. They'll understand they can hear from God, too. Even better are the words of Jesus who speaks to us in the New Testament!

Answer their questions with eternity in mind. This is a lifestyle choice. When your kids are upset about a pet dying and wonder if their pet is going to heaven, answer the best you can. (It's fine if you don't know the answer for sure!) Tell what you do know about heaven. If you're outside marveling at a beautiful flower or sunset, remind them of our Creator who made such a beautiful world for us to live in.

If your child has an angry outburst and has concerns about another child getting away with something unfair or wrong, you can remind them of who they are. Children of God, forgiven by Jesus, loved by the Lord of the Universe, created with a purpose. Answering their questions about the sins of others is often more beneficial after emotions have calmed and they've accepted their responsibility (if any) in the situation.

Pray or bless your kids in front of your kids, and with your kids. My kids each chose their own blessing we said over them after bedtime prayers. Were some of them a little funny? You bet! For example, "God is great God is

good, let us thank Him for our sleep." was one that was chosen. The important thing is that my adult children remember their parents blessing them nightly.

It's important that we create an environment that prompts wonder about God in our kids. We need to make space that invites them to ask questions about him. It's not a waste of our time our resources to create spaces that nurture a child's curiosity about their Creator. This time spent together is time spent in *The Presence of God*.

## Paying Attention to God's Creation

Cooler temps + campfires + conversations = FUN and something sacred as I enjoy the presence of friends and family...the presence of God in His creation...the reminder of the Holy Spirit's presence as the flames jump around the fire pit.

But, if I'm not paying attention, I can miss the opportunity to invite others to notice God's presence too.

Laura wrote these devotional prompts to help us pause and start brief faith conversations in these sacred relational moments:

- Find something to notice and marvel at God's creation (Observe)
- 2. Share memories or favorite aspects of the activity. (Share)
- 3. Highlight natural connections between creation and God's Word. (Connect/Read) Consider bringing a Bible or downloading the Bible app.

#### For example:

**Take a walk** - Bring a magnifying glass, hammock, or blanket <u>Observe</u>: the animals and insects you can see. What details can you notice about them?

<u>Share</u>: Recall an animal encounter you've had. What's an animal you find interesting? Why?

<u>Connect</u>: Read about creation in Genesis 1:1-2:4 or the creation of animals and humans in Genesis 1:20-31.

- Notice God's power in the weather Jesus calms the storm. Mark 5:35-41 or The sun stands still. Joshua 10:12-15
- **Look at the stars** God's promise to Abraham (we are part of that promise). Genesis 15:1-6, Romans 4:16, 23-25
- Campfires Moses and the Burning Bush. Exodus 3:1-6 or Pillars of Cloud and Fire. Exodus 13:20-22
- **Ball fields** Run with endurance, eyes on Jesus. Hebrews 12:1-4

Homeless people. Living in the woods, hanging around outside a shelter downtown, or "signing" at the top of an exit ramp. What feelings do you have when you read these words and imagine the pictures in your mind? There's probably some tension in your gut, right? It's not comfortable to think about these folks. It wasn't for WLC members Jeff Linert and Andrew Abicht either. But they learned a different way to think about these folks when they got involved with Settled, a Christcentered non-profit that utilizes a "Community First" approach to chronic homelessness. More about Jeff and Andrew in a minute ...

Woodbury Lutheran Church has an exciting opportunity: we're partnering with Settled to create a new community for some friends suffering from not having a home. We want you to join us **October 8-19** as we build "tiny homes" with several other metro churches. The homes will be built by servants like you at a large parking lot at Woodland Hills Church in St. Paul. And they'll become part of what Settled calls a Sacred Settlement!

Pray about joining one of these servant teams; you can serve 1 day or all 8 days! Besides helping to <u>build</u>, we need help <u>providing lunch</u> to the work crew, <u>praying</u> for this exciting mission, and being a general helper

onsite. You are also welcome to donate to the cost of the tiny home. If you're interested in signing up, go to this <u>link</u>. For more information contact <u>Mike Sabbann</u> and visit <u>BeSettled.org</u> to learn of this ministry.

Let's get back to Jeff and Andrew. After meeting in January 2019 with the CEO of Settled, Gabrielle Clowdus, they had a new perspective of the homeless. One that adopts Jesus' view of them: His children whom He loves. And they acted quickly. During the deadly Polar Vortex (remember those bitter sub-zero temperatures in February 2019?), they mobilized WLC with other churches to help many chronically homeless get off the streets. Two of these people are David and Laura. God's radical love changed the hearts of Jeff and Andrew, and they've walked alongside David and Laura, helping them find stable housing, and more importantly, becoming dear friends. Over the last year, other WLC disciples have supported David & Laura through acts of love and social belonging. Instead of feelings of tension and discomfort, Jeff and Andrew have compassion when they think of the "homeless". We have a lot to learn about homelessness. Come learn with us in October as we build a community for them.

#### Settled's Approach

social Unlike most service organizations and governmental entities that aim to provide "housing first," Settled's approach is more holistic, and focuses on providing "community first". Their research indicates the chronically homeless suffer from a profound loss of community and family. Thus, a key part of the solution must be providing a pathway to community. The approach helps people find social belonging and addresses some of the underlying problems that come with a life of experiencing homelessness. It surrounds those who are newly housed with a support network of advocates, working on their behalf, to help mentor them and journey with them. Please visit BeSettled.org to learn more.

Having them present in-person is one of the aspects of teaching that gives us energy and motivates us to come in each day. As educators, we feed off of their excitement, curiosity, joy, and desire to learn. It is encouraging for us to have them ask questions and apply concepts that we've been talking about.

One of the Bible stories that we do each September is Jesus and the Children. One of the options that some of the teachers have used is to play Red Light, Green Light with the children. Red light "STOP" the disciples said "Jesus is too busy and you can't bother him." Green light "GO" said Jesus, "I'm never too busy for children! I love them and I want to spend time with them." Just like our teachers find joy in children, clearly so did Jesus.

As our school year goes on, children will repeatedly hear the message that "Jesus is their forever friend" and that "Jesus loves YOU!" We talk about how Jesus is with us on good days and on bad days and that he doesn't leave us when we're sad or mad but he is with us always.

Being in the presence of Jesus is an important concept but also a big one! Do we always grasp that we are being loved and cared for unconditionally by Jesus? Do you ever write him in on your list of best friends? It can be easy to say this but how does this look? Thankfully we have a God who blesses us with people around us who love us unconditionally. My hope is that this year is filled with many green light GO moments for our children as our school team blesses them with love and grace and



maybe just a glimpse of what it will really be like to be in the presence of Jesus someday.

## The Group's Role in Spiritual Growth

Small groups are important. One of the benefits of a healthy small group is growing your faith. It's why we have groups and encourage our members to be in a group. Faith is personal, but that doesn't mean faith is private. Small groups help us to actually live our faith with others. Here are three things the group contributes to an individual's spiritual growth.

- 1. Support—Whether it's building muscle at the gym or building faith in God, resistance is a necessary ingredient of growth. In order to learn to trust God more, we have to experience the kind of challenging circumstances in which trust is required. That's not easy. The emotional and spiritual support of community can sustain us through adversity, help us to see God in action in our lives, and remind us to hold onto faith even when doing so is difficult or doesn't seem to make sense.
- 2. Encouragement—We human beings aren't all that adept at recognizing our own potential. Too often it takes someone else pointing out the gap between where we are and where we could be in order for us to catch a vision for our possible futures. Most of us had parents, teachers, or coaches who changed the course of our lives by pointing out our gifts and giving us confidence to pursue those gifts. When it comes to spiritual growth, groups can help individuals recognize and reach for their own potential.
- 3. Challenge—Real growth requires a level of self-awareness that doesn't shy away from one's shortcomings. We all have them. None of us is perfect. When we enter into intentional community with others who are also trying to grow spiritually, we have an opportunity to tap into an outside perspective on



ourselves. We may have to face some hard truths, but facing those truths is the only way we can overcome the obstacles to our growth.

#### Worship:
